#### PART I GENERAL EXPECTATIONS

The Minersville Area School District agrees to implement the following statutory requirements:

    - Meetings are scheduled at a variety of times to accommodate parent schedules and/or requests – during school hours, before or after school, and evening. Phone conferences are held with those parents who are unable to attend.
    - On-line grades, homework completion, information from classroom teachers, Title progress reports.
    - Individual classroom teacher newsletters and web-sites where applicable.
    - Title 1 web-sites.
    - (3) The Minersville Elementary Center will provide materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their children's academic achievement, such as literacy training and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement through:
      - Parent workshops, provided by the Schuylkill Intermediate Unit, scheduled at various times to help parents work with their children to improve academic achievement in reading.
      - Information packets which include lists of appropriate educational websites.

- (4) The Minersville Area School District will, with the assistance of its schools and parents, educate its teachers, pupil services personnel, principals, and other staff, in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners, in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to implement and coordinate parent programs and build ties between parents and schools, by:
  - Discussing parent involvement activities at faculty meetings.
  - Exploring parent involvement in-service programs for teachers, staff members, and parents.
  - Participate in local parent involvement trainings when available.
  - Parent/Teacher conferences
- (5) The Minersville Area Elementary Center will take the following actions to ensure that information related to the school and parent programs, meetings, and other activities, is sent to the parents of participating children in an understandable and uniform format, including alternative formats upon request, and the extent practicable, in a language the parents can understand.
  - The Federal Programs coordinator will relate all information about Title I program, meetings, and other information to the parents of participating children in an understandable and uniform format. Meetings and/or notices will be sent out at least ten days prior to the events and/or activities.
  - Social media outreach
- (6) Annual activities for parent involvement: (Parents are given the opportunity to discuss changes or amendments to our policy and program.
  - *Orientation Night* held in early September. Title I staff will be introduced to all parents. Eligibility and purpose of the program will be discussed.
  - Informational meeting/Parent Make & Take in late September/early October. Title I staff will be introduced and policies and procedures for the year as well as how funds are spent will be discussed. This is for first and second grade students and their parents, including non-public. Parent/Student/Teacher Compact will be discussed and signed. Title 1 will host a Book Bingo Night for First and Second Grade during the Informational Meeting.
  - Parent Teacher Conferences held in November at various times during the day. Phone conferences are given upon request throughout the year.
  - Fall Reading Fest for all kindergarten students and parents, including non-public students, at the Early Childhood Center in Llewellyn. A meeting with parents in attendance will be held to discuss Title I operations and other school/educational issues and concerns. Reading tips and materials will be provided to aid parents at home.
  - Parent Evaluation Program session held in April at the Minersville Elementary Center for Kindergarten through 2<sup>nd</sup> grade parents. Parents have an opportunity to provide suggestions and give feedback about the program that can be implemented the following year.

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- D. The Llewellyn Early Childhood Center will provide assistance to parents of children served by school in understanding topics such as the following by undertaking the actions described in this paragraph
  - the State's academic content standards
  - the State's student academic achievement standards

  - Fall Reading Fest for all kindergarten students and parents, including non-public students, at the Early Childhood Center in Llewellyn. A meeting with parents in attendance will be held to discuss Title I operations and other school/educational issues and concerns. Reading tips and materials will be provided to aid parents at home.

#### **PART III** Parent Participation Forum
